The Literacy Council of Wake County received funding through a Student Success activity grant to provide a two-day training session for community college and community based organization Basic Skills/literacy personnel on Thursday, May 22, 2008, from 10:00-4:00 and Friday, May 23, 2008, from 8:00-4:00. The session will focus on building learning communities and contextualized instruction. This session is being conducted by ProLiteracy America which provides excellent training. The training is applicable to both community colleges and community based organizations.

Not only is the training **free** to participants (except for transportation costs to the session), but it is being held at the Caraway Conference Center and Camp in Sophia, North Carolina (near High Point). Each participant will have his/her own private room and meals will be provided. It is a wonderful, relaxed setting which participants will enjoy. You are encouraged to send staff members as a team.



For: Literacy Program Directors and Staff

Community Based Organizations and Community College Basic Skills staff members are encouraged to attend as a team.



Where: Caraway Conference Center and Camp in Sophie, NC (Central NC)

Caraway is located in a very rural area in Sophia, NC with both indoor and outdoor classrooms. Participants will appreciate the peaceful setting as they work on their organizational development skills and their relationships with colleagues and students. Visit www.Caraway.org for more information.

Cost: NONE, it's free! All you are responsible for is your transportation. 60 participants can be accommodated and each participant will have their own private room in the lodge. Fabulous meals will also be provided including Thursday's lunch and dinner and. Friday's breakfast and lunch. Funding for this training has been provided by the NC Community College System.

What: 2 Day Literacy Training

Day 1 - 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The first day will be a day dedicated to building strong relationships amongst basic skills providers and will include how to make a stronger impact through regionalism, collaboration, sharing resources, and leadership skill development. The focus will be on successful process and program management, methods to effectively self-organize, and how to refine our communications. Some activities will be held outdoors and will include rope courses, wall climbing, and puzzle solving which work to build teamwork and cooperation. Planned activities will be appropriate for all levels of fitness.

Day 2 - 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. The second day's training will be facilitated by ProLiteracy America and be broken into two parts.

Part 1. Building Learning Communities

Being part of a "community" and building relationships with the instructor and other students improves student motivation and persistence, retention and commitment. Participants will learn about

- the benefits of group learning for students
- what three types of students value in collaborative learning
- strategies for building community within your classroom

Part 2. Contextualized Instruction

Contextual instruction connects education to students' everyday lives, creating a bridge between the classroom and outside environment. The participant will



- understand how research supports contextualized instruction
- explore methods for identifying content and materials for contextualized instruction
- create a lesson plan based on principles of contextualized instruction

This ProLiteracy America training will provide intense instruction on building learning communities and contextualized instruction. In this workshop, participants will examine group development models and recent research from NCSALL (The National Center for the Study of Adult Learning and Literacy) on adults' "ways of knowing" (instrumental, socializing, and self-authoring) that impact their experience of learning in groups. Participants will consider the implications of this research on sample lessons and for their own lesson planning. With research on group learning as a backdrop, workshop participants will then explore how contextualized instruction contributes to learner outcomes.
