Basic Skills State Leadership Advisory Board

The Basic Skills Advisory Board was established by Randy Whitfield in May 1996 to get input from local programs and share information with local programs. The name was later changed to the Basic Skills State Leadership Advisory Board because the board makes recommendations for state leadership activities.

The following are the mission and goals of the Basic Skills State Leadership Advisory Board:

- To provide leadership for the advancement of Basic Skills education in North Carolina.
- To assist System Office Basic Skills staff in making decisions regarding state leadership funding.
- To assist the System Office Basic Skills staff in overseeing state leadership programs.
- To disseminate and receive information to Basic Skills regions and their directors.

The Board meets four times each year. After each Board meeting, Board members are asked to meet with Basic Skills Directors in their regions to disseminate information from the System Office. Any issues that need to be addressed by the Advisory Board may either be sent to the Board by Board members or System Office staff.







How do I obtain a copy of my GED?

The State GED office:

- ⇒ Only provides duplicate transcripts... duplicate diplomas are not provided
- ⇒ Does not maintain Adult High School Records... contact the school where you obtained your AHS Diploma
- ⇒ Issues GED diplomas to examinees who complete testing in North Carolina
- ⇒ Only maintains records for GED diplomas earned by North Carolina residents
- ⇒ Will not release student information without the student's signature
- ⇒ Will not release information over the phone
