## **Grant Guidelines and Instructions**

#### **Overview of the Grant Funds**

The North Carolina Community Colleges System (NCCCS) is committed to developing a skilled healthcare workforce. To support this effort, the NC General Assembly approved two allocations for distribution to local community colleges. These funds will support programming offered through Curriculum (CU) and Workforce Continuing Education (WCE).

Please note the following definitions:

- o High-Cost, New Start-up: Program Tier Designation (1A, 1B, 2), New to the College, or New to the System
- <u>Expansion</u> Examples: Add new courses (CE), Adds new degree options (CU), Increase student access/enrollment for upskilling or retraining, outreach to target/underserved populations, address waiting list, other.

### **Priority for Funding**

<u>All colleges are eligible to apply for these grant funds</u>. Priority for funding (bonus points) will be given to applications who meet at least one of the priorities listed below:

- 1. Proposal that are a part of a regional partnership with one or more colleges.
- 2. Proposals serving counties with a Tier 1 Economic Development Designation. See list below.

### **Application Process**

To be eligible, colleges must submit a completed application. NCCCS will release the official application on November 14, 2023. The round one deadline is December 15, 2023. The round two deadline is February 2, 2024. Please note that there is one application template for both grant programs—Start-Up and Expansion.

Below is an overview of the sections contained in the application template.

- (1) A description of the proposed new program or expansion.
- (2) Documentation of industry demand for the program and/or documentation of future local, regional, or statewide employment needs that will be met by the program.
- (3) Budget Worksheet with a narrative that outlines the detail grant request and total cash cost needed to support the college's proposed program for two fiscal years. This narrative will include information regarding the match requirement.
- (4) A plan for the fiscal sustainability of the program.

Proposed applications must be in alignment with the goals of the NCCCS Strategic Plan:

- Goal 1: Recruit and retain top talent to enable the North Carolina Community College System to educate and prepare the State's workforce.
- Goal 2: Increase access and enrollment at North Carolina community colleges to meet the state's educational attainment goal and expand postsecondary opportunities.
- Goal 3: Provide resources inside and outside the classroom for all students to successfully enroll, persist, and complete a career program of study.
- Goal 4: Provide education, training, and credentials to develop the most competitive workforce in the nation.

## **Eligibility for Funding**

All colleges are eligible to apply for these grant funds. For this funding cycle (January 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026), a college may submit proposals for **one start-up program** and **one expansion program**. If submitting for both, please prepare proposals separately. Below are the maximum allocations for both grant programs (Start-Up or Expansion) and the application type (single college or regional partnership).

## Allowable Expenses

Below is a list of allowable expenditures:

- Program-related Salary costs (Instructional, Non-Instructional, Employer's Retirement, Employer's Social Security, and Employer's Hospitalization/Medical)
- Instructional Supplies and Materials
- Program Equipment
- Staff Travel
- Curriculum Development
- Accreditation Costs
- Facility Preparation and Professional Development
- Other (Please consult with project staff)

Use of funds beyond these purposes is not prohibited but requires consultation with NCCCSO and written approval from the Senior Vice President/Chief Academic Officer. These funds are not intended to supplant Perkins funding.

## **Matching Funds**

College identified below will be required to match a percentage of the total cash cost of the program with non-State funds based on a college's total full-time equivalents (FTE) according to the following:

- (1) Community colleges with a total FTE greater than 6,500 shall be required to match fifteen percent (15%) of the cost.
- (2) Community colleges with a total FTE between 2,500 and 6,500 shall be required to match ten percent (10%) of the cost.

## **Reporting Requirements**

- Colleges will be required to submit monthly fiscal reports and quarterly progress reports. The information contained in these reports will include the following:
  - (1) The community colleges that received funds, the amount of funds, and the types of healthcare programs started.
  - (2) The use of funds by community colleges receiving awards, including costs associated with student instruction, faculty salaries, instructional supplies, related instructional equipment, and accreditation costs.
  - (3) Evaluation of the success of the healthcare programs receiving funds.

## **Evaluation Criteria**

Below is the evaluation criteria for scoring and ranking proposal.

	<ul> <li>(8-10 Points) The proposal demonstrates a deep understanding of industry needs, and the proposed program is highly relevant and feasible. Market research and demand analysis are thorough and convincing.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>(4-7 Points) The proposal aligns with industry needs and presents a feasible program, but there are minor gaps in the supporting evidence related to data analysis and/or employer engagement.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>(0-3 Points) The proposal has some data to support the alignment with industry needs and/or employer engagement, but the narrative is not convincing.</li> </ul>

	o (8-10 Points) The budget is detailed, realistic, and well-justified.		
	<ul> <li>4-7 Points) The budget is mostly realistic but has some minor discrepancies in the budget justification.</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>(4-5 Points) The sustainability plan is detailed, outlining diverse funding streams and strong strategies for long-term viability.</li> </ul>		
	o (2-3 Points) The sustainability plan is presented but lacks depth in certain areas.		
	o (0-1 Points) The sustainability plan is weak and lacks viable strategies.		
	Reviewer's Overall Impression and Potential Impact	5	
	<ul> <li>(4-5 Points) The proposal leaves a strong impression, demonstrating innovation and a clear potential for significant positive impact on the community and healthcare sector.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>(2-3 Points) The proposal is promising and shows potential for impact but lacks some elements that could make it outstanding.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>(0-1 Points) The proposal lacks a compelling vision or impact, with little innovation or impact demonstrated.</li> </ul>
