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## **Additional Information**

- U.S. Department of Education (USED) recognizes two levels of educational accreditation: 1) institutional accreditation, which applies to an entire institution and includes the former regional accreditors, and 2) specialized or programmatic accreditation, which typically applies to programs, departments, or schools that are parts of an institution.
- In 2020, USED regulatory changes eliminated distinctions between regional and national accreditors. Consequently, agencies that were formerly known as "regional accreditors" were permitted to serve institutions outside their traditional boundaries. There are six (6) total former regional accreditors.
  - Higher Learning Commission (HLC)
  - Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE)
  - Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU)
  - New England Commission of Higher Education (NECHE)
  - Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC)
  - Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC)
- Several national accreditors recognized by USED include secondary or adult schools; private postsecondary institutions; career and technical education/vocational institutions; artistic units, dance units, musical units, etc.; or religious-affiliated institutions—the accreditors falling into these categories are likely not appropriate for NC community colleges.
- Regional accreditors generally share comparable standards relative to integrity; mission; eligibility; governance; administration & organization; faculty; planning & effectiveness; student achievement; academic programs; academic & student support services; financial & physical resources; library & learning/information resources; transparency & institutional representation; educational policies, procedures, & practices.
