STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES Allocation of Title II Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) Section 231 FY 2025-2026

<u>Request</u>: The State Board of Community Colleges (SBCC) is requested to approve \$14,420,996 in funding for 66 eligible providers for the purpose of adult education and literacy activities in accordance with the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), Title II Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA), Section 231.

<u>Strategic Plan Reference</u>: Goal 4: Economic and Workforce Development Provide education, training, and credentials to develop the most competitive and agile workforce in the nation. Strategy: 4.1

Background: In January 2021, the North Carolina Office of Adult Education opened a grant competition to eligible providers as required by WIOA Title I, §463.20. An RFP was issued to receive applications for a four-year grant award cycle for the 2021-22 through 2024-25 fiscal years. Continuation grant applications for the second year of funding were submitted by March 1, 2024. Continuation grant applications were reviewed on several criteria required by federal law and all 66 applicants met the criteria. Section 231 funding is available for an eligible provider soliciting funding for Adult Education programs sponsored by the North Carolina Community Colleges System (NCCCS) to enable the provider to develop, implement and improve adult education and literacy activities within the State.

<u>Method of Allocation</u>: Title II WIOA funds for AEFLA are distributed by the NCCCS according to a formula adopted by the SBCC on February 16, 2018, and amended on June 8, 2018. These funds are intended to supplement an organization's adult education activities. The formula has 3 components:

- 1. **Base**: 15% of available funding is allocated equally across providers. The base component is available to all providers.
- 2. **Access**: 50% of available funding is allocated for access. Access is determined by contact hours of participants within 3 weighted tiers:
 - **Tier A** Weight 5: Beginning Adult Basic Education Literacy, Beginning Adult Basic Education, Beginning English as a Second Language (ESL) Literacy, Beginning ESL **Tier B** Weight 4: Low Intermediate ESL, High Intermediate ESL, Low Advanced ESL, High Advanced ESL, Low Intermediate Adult Basic Education, High Intermediate Adult Basic Education
 - **Tier C** Weight 3: Adult Secondary Education Low, Adult Secondary Education High The access component is available only to providers who have submitted 2023-2024 data.
- 3. **Performance:** 35% of available funding is allocated for performance. Performance allocations are determined by the number and percentage of basic skills participant periods of participation with a Measurable Skill Gains (MSGs). (Under federal regulations, a period of participation begins when a participant enters the program and does not end until a participant exits the program. If a student has 12 or more contact hours during this time, the student is classified as a participant within a period of participation. Measurable skills gains are required by WIOA and are used to demonstrate participants' progress toward achieving a credential or employment. The performance component is available only to providers who have submitted 2023-2024 data.

Infrastructure Agreement Cost Sharing Agreement: All required One-Stop partners, including WIOA Title II providers, must contribute to the infrastructure costs of the local One-Stop delivery system. In North Carolina, the Community College System follows the Local Funding Mechanism as outlined in 34 CFR 463.715 through 463.730. Under this framework, local partners, including Title II providers, work collaboratively to negotiate and reach mutual agreement on key elements: each partner's contribution to infrastructure costs, the proportionality of those contributions based on the relative benefit or use of the One-Stop system by each program, and the timing and method of payments. Title II providers are expected to contribute at least 1.5 percent of their administrative funds to Infrastructure Funding Agreement (IFA) costs, with a maximum contribution of 5 percent. This cooperative process ensures that the cost-sharing approach is fair, transparent, and aligned with federal regulations.
